
## Difficult times

This time of year is always busy and heart-breaking, but with spay/neuter surgeries postponed by the pandemic restrictions on veterinary clinics, we expect to see a huge increase in the number of kittens being born.

As of 16 May, FFN has taken in 28 kittens. All 28 kittens were homeless and two of the litters were orphaned after the mother cats were killed on the road. Fortunately, we were able to bring in the mom cats for the other litters. Some of the little ones were in dire straits with infected eyes, bad upper respiratory infections, diarrhea, etc. – for some, it was touch-and-go.

Motherless kittens need special kitten milk – KMR (which is very expensive) – and extra care. It's challenging, but thanks to the excellent kitten fosters we have in our volunteer base, all of the kittens are doing well.

FFN has 37 cats waiting for spay/neuter surgery. Although vet clinics are now able to ease restrictions, many are back-logged, short-staff, and having difficulty getting personal protective equipment. There is going to be a wait for some time.



# Pawsing intake of cats and kittens

Effective immediately, we are no longer able to take in cats or kittens. Our two TNR/Foster/ Adoption Coordinators are currently managing forty-six felines in our programs, most waiting for spays or neuters. Due to the high numbers, the postponement of spay/neuter surgeries, and the health issues that many of the cats and kittens currently in our care have, we regret that it's necessary to put intakes on hold.

If you or someone you know finds a homeless cat or kitten in need, please do all you can to help it. The cats are going to need the help of all of the caring members of our community. Also, see the list of cat rescues on our website at www.felinefriends.ca/cat-rescues.



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Our volunteers are still working hard during these difficult times. We have had foster homes doing FaceTime chats with potential adopters, lots of e-mails, messages, and phone conversations. All of the kittens, except the very tiny ones, have been adopted and most have gone to their foster-to-adopt homes. Because FFN does not adopt out un-altered animals, cats or kittens adopted at this time are going as foster-to-adopt, meaning that only once they are altered and vaccinated will the adoption be official.

We have had calls for injured cats within Stratford and, fortunately, with the help of the community, we were able to secure them and get them medical attention. FFN is getting more and more calls within the City of Stratford and it sometimes feels like we are providing animal control, which is not our mandate.

Our Low-Income Spay/Neuter Assistance Program has also been affected. The House of Blessing and Salvation Army in Perth County,

who conduct income assessments for us, have been unable to have face-to-face meetings. This means that, unless a person is already a client of those organizations, people are unable to get vouchers for the free spay/neuter of cats in their household. And, as appointments for spay/neuter surgeries remain difficult to get, those who have qualified for vouchers must wait. The unwanted behaviours of un-neutered males (spraying, roaming, aggression) and un-spayed females (heat cycles) will be stressful for pet owners and we fear may cause some people to surrender or abandon pets.

How you can help:

- Become an FFN member or renew your membership (this is an actual paid membership) for \$15 annually at https://www.felinefriends.ca/ membership
- Donate any amount you can and/or donate wish-list items. We are always in need of clumping unscented litter, cat/kitten food, cleaning supplies such as dish soap, laundry soap, paper towels, etc.: https://www.felinefriends.ca/donate
- Donate cat care items. We go through boxes of Forti Flora, so if you have any you're not using, it would be appreciated. It can only be purchased at vet clinics or on-line and is expensive. It has been a huge help with our cats, many of whom have not been eating properly for a long time. Feliway is a spray or plug in (available at vet clinics) that can help our frightened foster cats.
- Become a member of 100 Feline Friends Who Care, donate your empties to our bottle drive, and/or purchase Puddy Products (details on all three of these ways to help follow in the article "Fundraising during a Pandemic" on page 4)
- To our colony feeders please pick up food at the designated area. If you are purchasing food for reimbursement, please inform your colony leader what kind of food it is, and we will try to secure discounted or donated food for you.
- Volunteer foster cats/kittens, organize a mini-fundraiser, or lend your time or talent in some way.







### Miracle kittens

I've never wanted to foster kittens more than I did this year. Being stuck indoors seemed like the perfect time to help orphaned kittens.

When I got the call that there were three kittens who needed a foster, I was so excited – I didn't know the next few weeks were going to be such a roller coaster!

When the kittens arrived, they were in a box – three tiny black fluffballs. Only a little over one week old, all three were sneezing a lot and were so congested they could barely breathe. Their noses and eyes were completely gunked shut. I honestly didn't think they would all make it.

After discovering that all three were boys, I named them Rocky, Bullwinkle and Boris. Feeding time was a struggle. Rocky absolutely refused to eat and although he was so tiny, he really put up a fight. They had to be fed every two hours and it often took me close to an hour because Rocky could only be coaxed to eat a few drops at a time.

They started eating a lot better after the vet prescribed some antibiotics. But then Bullwinkle decided he didn't want to eat at all! Back to the vet where they were given a different antibiotic for upper respiratory infections and another antibiotic for eye infections.

Bullwinkle started to eat again and their eyes began to clear up. Their eye infections had been so

bad that there was a possibility that Rocky could be blind. But the vet determined that he had ulcers on his eyes and that, with luck, the eye drops would clear them up completely. During the two weeks the kittens also would not poop. The poor little guys had to have two enemas.

Rocky, Bullwinkle, and Boris are finally all doing great. Their eye infections are gone, their upper respiratory infections are almost gone, and Rocky's eyes are improving! They eat like crazy, have quite big personalities, and love to play.

After worrying that they wouldn't all make it, I am so thrilled that they are all doing so well. I've never fostered kittens that were this sick before but I'd absolutely do it again. While it was definitely a lot of work – and I didn't get much sleep! – it was so rewarding to be able to help them and to watch them overcome each obstacle. I loved it and can't wait to help more kittens. And I hope these boys find the best "furever" homes!

I am indebted to the species of the cat for a particular kind of honorable deceit, for a great control over myself, for characteristic aversion to brutal sounds, and for the need to keep silent for long periods of time.

# The story of Elvis and Ralph



## What is it like to be owned by a blind cat? An update on Olive!

A few years ago, in my Facebook feed, I saw a picture of a little orange kitten squinting at the camera and I fell in love! It turned out that she wasn't squinting. When Olive was found, FFN initially thought she had a very bad eye infection. But the vet determined that her eyes were malformed and had to be removed. Her eye sockets were sewn shut for protection, giving her the adorable "squint" that captured my heart.

Because of the malformation, Olive was never able to see. This becomes clear when you meet her because nothing – and I mean absolutely *nothing* – holds her back!

When we adopted Olive, we thought there might be SOME adjustments to be made, some "special needs" to be met. But Olive truly isn't very different from other cats and we only needed to adapt two things for her – a vertical board covered in sisal to help her climb up onto our high bed (our bedroom is too small for a ramp or stairs) and we fenced in our

deck and a portion of our yard so that she can enjoy the outdoors like her sighted, adopted brothers.

Olive gets up on the coffee table, chairs, and on our cat-towers with no problems! She does trip on things, gets almost stepped-on a lot, and occasionally she runs into the walls. She also beats up her adopted siblings and is, in fact, the alpha cat of the household despite being almost half her brothers' size. She loves sunbeams, warm laps, and chasing bugs in the yard.

While she gets very excited when she hears wrappers, tin foil, or other crinkly sounds, some of Olive's favourite toys, ironically, are the small fuzzy balls that make absolutely no sound – at least, no sound discernable to our feeble human ears.

In the end, being owned by a blind cat has proved to be much the same as being owned by any other cat! We often forget that Olive is "different" but when we remember, she is a source of wonder, amazement, and joy.

AAF was founded to address the issue of animal over-population and homeless pets, which they do by supporting spay/neuter programs like ours. FFN is so grateful to be chosen! # Do you know what to do for an animal in an EMERGENCY?

Here's what to do if you need to report an animal in distress, animal abuse, or if your pet has an afterhours medical emergency:

Call **1.833.9.ANIMAL** (**264625**) to report an animal in distress or being neglected. This includes animals that are injured, in pain, sick, suffering or abused, abandoned, or lacking proper care, water, food, or shelter.

Call **311** (animal control) to report a wild animal in distress, injured, or deceased. Also to report a wild or domestic animal roaming on public property.

Call **911** (emergency) to report an emergency where a life is in immediate danger or distress such as an animal attack or animal in a hot vehicle. Also to report Illegal activity such as dog/cock fighting rings.
