
#### Alley Cat Café

# FEED-A-FERAL FOOD DRIVE – DONATIONS NEEDED!



# 400+ adoptions!

Did you know? Since 2016, FFN has adopted out over 400 cats! All of these were homeless cats! It's hard – and heartbreaking – to believe that so many homeless cats were out there. And, unfortunately, 99.9% of them were not spayed or neutered. Since one female cat can have an average of 5 kittens per litter, and up to 3 litters per year –for a total of 15 kittens per year! – just imagine the number of homeless kittens that could have been born if FFN had not been able to trap them, have them "fixed," and find fur-ever homes for them. Spread the word – spay or neuter your kitten before his or her first litter!
